Old Marker Unearthed in Making School Land Survey

A relic of days long since passed was discovered when Captain W. G. Watts, a civil engineer of Silver Bay and Ticonderoga, surveyed all lands owned by the schools of the village of Ticonderoga, with the purpose of setting concrete corner posts to mark the boundary lines of all school property.

At the northwest corner of the site of the Weedville school in West Exchange street, in excavating to set a concrete marker, a cedar post was struck by the spade about 2½ feet below the surface of the ground. It proved to have been the corner post of an ancient survey coming in the identical spot of the present survey, and doubtless covered over in grading the lot. Investigation of the ancient records of the town showed that at one time, nearly century ago, the land was the site of a Universalist church and thus far no old resident has been found who has any idea of what ever became of the old church.
