MRS. EMOGENE PAYNE IS DEAD

Highly Respected Lady Had Been Ill for Several Months Past—
Funeral Saturday at 11 o'clock From the Universalist Church

Mrs. Emogene Richmond Payne, widow of the late Philo Payne of Payneville, died last evening at the home of her daughter, Mrs. C. C. Coats, of Park avenue, following an illness of several months, of hardening of the arteries and grip, which was followed by mental derangement for the past two or three weeks. Death relieved her sufferings at 10 o'clock last evening.

Mrs. Payne, whose maiden name was Richmond, was born July 20, 1852 at Oswayo, Pa., and on her fifteenth birthday was married to Mr. Payne, and with him settled on the farm at Payneville now occupied by her grandson, Phil S. Coats, where the balance of her life was spent with the exception of a little over one year in this village.

To them was born one daughter, Lettie O., now Mrs. Cass C. Coats.

Mrs. Payne was a devout and very active member of the Universalist Church of this village, also a member of the Woman's Relief Corps.

Besides the daughter, Mrs. Payne is survived by a grandson, Phil S. Coats, two great-grandchildren, one brother, Leroy Richmond of Payneville and a sister, Mrs. May Davis of Loveland, Colo.

Funeral services will be held from the Universalist Church, Saturday at 11 o'clock, Rev. J. D. Herrick of Towanda, Pa., officiating, assisted by Rev. C. L. Paddock.

Whitesville has lost another of her substantial residents in Mrs. Payne's passing.
